### Chairman's Dig

We are now on the threshold of a new ESB season, which promises to be a bumper one, beginning with two lectures in October. The first is by a young Canadian scholar who has been studying the diffusion and influence of the *Description de l'Égypte*, the mammoth publication of Egypt's monuments that was the fruit of Napoleon's expedition to Egypt in 1798. This expedition is often cited as the jumping-off point for modern Egyptology, and the *Description* as the starting point of scientific publication, so this promises to be a fascinating insight into this seminal period.

The Autumn lectures very much focus on the way that ancient Egypt has been placed before the modern world. The next lecture looks at its influence on the great novelist Sir Rider Haggard (1856-1925), famous for *King Solomon's Mines* and *She*, and the November one on the shenanigans that surrounded the recovery of royal mummies from the royal cache at Deir el-Bahari in 1881. Much has been written on them, but as our lecturer will show, the whole story is still elusive. In this connection, members may have seen that the 'missing' mummy of Ramesses I seems to have been identified in a museum collection in the U.S.A. The Chairman has previously examined this mummy, and fully concurs with it being a Ramesses (although with a residual thought that it might be VII!). The interesting thing is that it came out of Egypt in the 1860s, whereas the conventional story has the cache of royal mummies only being found by tomb robbers in 1871 ....

Following a break in December, while the ESB heads off to Egypt (we are already plotting a trip to **Middle Egypt** for 2004), January begins with a welcome return by Colin Reader, who gave us an excellent talk on the Great Sphinx a little while ago. He has recently returned from Saqqara, where all kinds of interesting features have been revealed by scientific survey. The AGM in February is accompanied by a lecture on the 'vestal virgins' of the god Amun by the Chairman, and the Winter Party. The party – and at least some of the earlier

lectures – will feature a special raffle in addition to the usual one: this is to support ....

### Adopt-a-mummy

Some of you will remember a feature in the *Evening Post* which looked at a scheme to sponsor the restoration and redisplay of the animal mummies in the Cairo Museum. The Director of this project, Dr Salima Ikram, will be lecturing in Bristol in March, both for the ESB and delivering the Amelia Edwards Memorial Lecture at the University. Salima is an outstanding speaker – those with long memories may remember her speaking in Bristol a few years ago; others may recall her as the Best Man (*sic*) at the Chairman and Treasurer's wedding .... What we would like the ESB to do is to sponsor an animal and present her with a cheque when she is over. The star prize will be a limited edition 'Animal Mummy Project' signed by Salima, one of which be modelled by an Officer at Autumn lectures.

The summer term will feature a fascinating look at the vanished world of Nubia, now lost beneath the waters of Lake Nasser through the medium of the slides of the late Professor J. Martin Plumley of Cambridge University, who directed rescue work there in the 1960s. The year will then be rounded off with an exploration of Egyptian dreams, part of an area of ancient Egypt that we have little investigated in earlier programmes, but hope to do more regarding in future years.

A few places are still available on **Oxford** trip next month. The Ashmolean Museum has one of the UK's outstanding collections, while the city has of course many other attractions. If you'd like to come along, please return the appropriate form on page 3.

Plans are also afoot for future trips as well as the aforementioned Egyptian trek – please see the bottom of the next page for information on a potential visit to **Belgium** and the **Netherlands** next year.
